Area offers more room to learn

ODYSSEY House opened its doors to celebrate its 33rd anniversary on Sunday 31 October. A new indoor learning area at Odyssey House's high-tech centre was unveiled on Friday. The \$2.5 million centre received a \$250,000 federal government grant under the Building for Education Innovation program. The grant allowed for the construction of a covered outdoor learning area, as well as indoor classrooms, with management and accessible toilet.

The area will be used to hold group therapy meetings, cultural programs and to encourage patients' families during weekend visits. It will also be a place for the centre's students to learn essential English and maths, computer skills, social skills, personal development, writing skills and life skills. Odyssey House chief executive James Pitts said: "This year it's about how you can rely on friends and family to support you and family is so important. We want to capture that. Some people took photos of their family and friends and gave them to MacKenzie and I. It was a great moment. We were of the adult category. Mary Brasile, of Campbelltown, was the winner. She was grateful to the cafe staff for donating the venue. We're working with the mental health association campaign," she said.

Ms Brasile said the exhibition also encouraged those with a mental illness to use art to help their recovery. "It helps them express themselves which is good for their emotional wellbeing and helps them stay connected," she said.

Alcohol and Your Kids

There are many good reasons to encourage teenagers not to drink alcohol before 18, unfortunately as parents we can't keep an eye on our teenagers all of the time. Early drinking patterns are related to the possibility of damage to the developing brain which is estimated not to be fully developed until age 25 and to the development of alcohol related harm in adulthood.

As the silly season approaches as a parent you can positively influence your teenagers drinking habits. Here are some useful tips:

- Set a good example in your own consumption of alcohol
- Reward good behaviour for responsible attitude towards alcohol
- Talk about how to deal with peer pressure to consume alcohol or binge drink

While the safest option is to delay drinking for as long as possible, you should educate your child on responsible drinking such as what is a standard drink, setting limits, alternating with non alcoholic drinks, drink slowly, and eat before or while you are drinking.

The risks of accidents, injuries, violence and self harm are high among drinkers aged under 18 and young people who drink are more prone to risky and antisocial behaviour. Help keep your teenagers safe this summer.

A message from the Chief Executive Officer

It is always remarkable how quickly the year passes at Odyssey House. This is due to the amount of time and energy required to maintain the quality of all of the Odyssey House program services. Quality, in our service delivery, has been the major focus of the efforts of all staff over the course of this year. We have been engaged in a quality assurance accreditation review with the Australian Council on Healthcare Standards (ACHS) this past year.

ACHS is the body which accredits hospitals, both public and private and other health care providers. Their requirements are upon a level of service delivery which is client focussed (clinical) and underpinned by quality processes and procedures which have been evaluated (corporate). There are over 30 standards in various categories which had to be met in order to achieve accredited status from ACHS. The surveyors who conducted the review were on site at the Odyssey facilities from 7-9 September. They reviewed numerous documents which contained policies and procedures as well as interviewing key staff and Board members.

We have received the report from the surveyors along with their recommendations. We passed all of the mandatory standards with a MA rating (Moderate Achievement) which is the standard to achieve accreditation. In addition we received EA ratings (Excellent Achievement) in 3 other categories: for service delivery; carer and consumer participation; and consumer involvement!

As an organisation we are very pleased with the results of our efforts. However, the process does not stop there as it is a process of "Continuous Quality Improvement" (CQI). Our plan now is to ensure that "Quality" continues to be synonymous with Odyssey Houses' services!
