When I wish upon a star

For Olivia, a 21-year-old resident who has recently reached the final stages of the Odyssey House drug rehabilitation program, this Christmas will be the happiest of her life.

Olivia had a terrible childhood – there was sexual, physical and emotional abuse from both her parents. Amazingly, despite her dysfunctional family life, Olivia was able to excel at school, becoming a school prefect and winning the Australian National Judo Title for her age and weight category.

However, at 13 years of age Olivia found she was unable to hide the pain and loneliness of her childhood any longer. Around the same time, her brother introduced her to intravenous drug use.


Olivia started using recreationally but it wasn't long before she was taking speed and ecstasy tablets every couple of days, despite still going to school. By the time Olivia was 15, she had also started to use cocaine and was asked to relinquish her position on the school council.

Not long after, Olivia's drug taking meant she could no longer compete at judo and she also left school.

"Judo was the only release where I could get away from what was happening at home. It was the one time I felt I was able to be myself and where what had happened in my life didn't matter. It also motivated me and gave me goals to look forward to."

Despite the turmoil that her drug use had created, after leaving school, Olivia was successful in securing a carpentry apprenticeship. She did this for a year but the collapse of a long-term relationship with her partner left her feeling particularly vulnerable.

Olivia moved interstate away from her dysfunctional family but yet again got caught up in the drug scene. She became involved in selling drugs and by

the time of her arrest at 18, Olivia weighed 43 kilos and was taking three ecstasy tablets a day, along with speed and cocaine. She had also suffered a complete emotional breakdown.

"When I first arrived at Odyssey House I thought it was impossible for me to want to live; I'd given up on life completely. I thought what's the point – life is too hard and is full of too much pain. I was just waiting and hoping that my drug use would slowly kill me."

Olivia has now been drug-free for two years and has turned her life around, thanks to the rehabilitation program at Odyssey House.

"The love and care I have received by the staff and other residents at Odyssey was exactly what I needed. For the first time in my life, other people were investing their love and trust in me. It was a struggle for me to let people know about my past and for me to place trust in others. But I succeeded and life is now good and definitely worth living," says Olivia.

"Christmas used to be a time that I regretted but this year it will be filled with love and a sense of achievement. I have people to share it with that I genuinely care about and although they may not be blood-related family, they are my

friends and people that I am close to," says Olivia.

Olivia is now studying design fundamentals at a Sydney TAFE and is living in a house in the inner city. She works at a hairdressing salon and her dream is to continue her studies and eventually find work in the advertising industry.

Steve Liebmann, is looking forward to doing something positive about Australia's growing drug problem.

"Drugs have a major impact on crime rates, health care costs and family functioning. The drug rehabilitation programs at Odyssey House have shown to be cost-effective and efficient in helping people with a drug dependency," said Steve.

A Road to RECOVERY

To demonstrate the real work of Odyssey House, this column features an Odyssey House resident's story.

For 38-year-old Steve, Odyssey House has enabled him to discover his true beliefs and values and most importantly, accept himself for the person he is.

Having recently graduated from the Odyssey House program Steve has successfully overcome his decade long struggle with an addiction to heroin.

Steve grew up in a loving, nurturing and stimulating household with well educated, successful and loving parents.

During his childhood, Steve's family spent over three years living in Washington DC and then returned to Melbourne, where Steve went to an exclusive private boys school.

"I found myself immersed in a control of enormous wealth and el...... and although I knew this didn't make me happy, it was my reality," says Steve.

Steve completed high school in 1980 and got the marks to do whatever university course he wanted. He moved to Sydney and started studying for a Bachelor of Economics degree.

"I chose what I believed was the easiest option and proceeded to do as little as possible. I continued to live a shallow life. It was around this time that I first tried heroin."

After completing his degree, Steve gained a position at a large computer company and quickly moved through the ranks.

"My life outside work was one of indulgence. I was partying hard, spending all my money and living the high life. I was also smoking pot and snorting cocaine like there was no tomorrow."

Steve's drug use continued over many years. After receiving a redundancy from his work, he married and went overseas.

On returning to Australia, Steve's addiction escalated at a rapid rate, "I had no purpose and no integrity. My soul felt tired."

After Steve's marriage ended, he moved in with his parents and his life continued to go downhill until he entered the Odyssey House program.

Steve believes his year and a half stay at Odyssey House has been an incredibly grounding experience.

"I am now able to make the choices

as to where my life goes. I have learnt to handle the everyday frustrations that life dishes up, without becoming overwhelmed.

Today, Steve couldn't be happier. He has a place of his own and is working.

"I have established a network of strong positive friendships that will help me through any challenges that lie ahead. Above all, I've had the privilege of getting to know some extraordinary people."

"I now feel that I have finally become a complete person – no empty spaces to fill with drugs or the other artificial realities I indulged in. Drug use is no longer a choice for me."
