

# Let's stick together.

For married couple, 45 year old Will and 34 year old Stephanie, the decision to enter Odyssey House after a longterm addiction to heroin, has not only saved their family but also their lives.

Will and Stephanie have been residing at the Parents and Children's Cottages at Odyssey House for the past year with their four young children seven year old Joshua, six year old Jessica, three year old Jackson and 20 month old baby Jason.

The couple met at university and both went on to become qualified nurses who travelled and worked in Thailand, Sri Lanka, Pakistan and Australia. using Although recreationally for most of their lives, Will and Stephanie both managed to work and start a young family.

"We reached a point where our drug taking escalated with the

stress of our everyday lives. By the time I was 32 years old, we had two children under two, a newborn baby premature and Will unemployed after having problems with his back things just got too much," says Stephanie.

The couple started using drugs every day and things got progressively worse until the children were taken from their care.

"We were devastated. We promised the kids it wouldn't happen again, but it did. We had access visits and finally went through a detoxification program at home. It was then we chose to come to Odyssey House, as we knew we couldn't face this battle without having our children with us," says Stephanie.

The children's milestones have been celebrated at Odyssey House during the past year, including baby Jason's first steps and Jackson's first words.


"Odyssey House has helped me become the person I have always wanted to be," says Stephanie.

"I will never go back to taking drugs - I would be too afraid that I could lose what I now have. I wake up in the morning and I feel good. I can sleep at night without having to take drugs and I have stopped hiding from problems and have learnt to face them," says Will.

Most importantly, says the couple, they have learnt how to be good, loving parents and are looking forward to seeing their children thrive at school and at home.

## 2003 Drug Action Week

With over fifty guests in attendance, the After Care program was able to demonstrate effectiveness at building a support network within the general community and the welfare field to build a resource base for its clients.

Drug Action Week was also celebrated with a mural dedication ceremony to officially open the new offices at the Vocational Education Training Centre at Odyssey House.

The mural, created by Odyssey House residents, features a number of bush scenes from noted Australian artist Frederick McCubbin.

# A Road to RECOVERY

To demonstrate the real work of Odyssey House, this column features an Odyssey House resident's story.

For 35 year old Mark, Odyssey House has provided a turning point in his life that was well overdue.

After spending eleven years in jail, Mark has been able to utilise the programs at Odyssey House to stay drugfree for the first time in over twenty years.

Mark grew up in Sydney and started taking drugs at 15 years of age.

"I took drugs because I felt so inadequate and unaccepted. I have overdosed three times over the last 20 years and in all :y, I feel very lucky to be arive," says Mark.

After being at the Odyssey House residential facility for the past six months, Mark believes he has been given a second chance at life. "Odyssey has given me a chance to live a life that is simple but with a future. I have seen so many lives destroyed by drugs and don't want to go down that path anymore," says Mark.

"My family is now very proud of me. For them to see me sober and straight and building a new life for myself, it is great – you can see the difference on their faces." Mark is now studying social welfare at University and plans to utilise his qualifications to work in the social welfare field.

"I have practical experience and want to be instrumental in helping other people recover, as well as maintaining my own recovery. I know it is an attainable goal," says Mark.
