Special Populations Young Adults Group

There are a number of "special populations" within the Odyssey House residential service. These include parents with children, residents with co-existing disorders of alcohol and other drug problems and mental health issues, and our younger residents, the young adults.

The Young Adults Group was established in July 2004 to accommodate the growing number of "young adults" within our population. It was felt they needed an adjustment to their therapeutic regimen

which was fun, had more action orientated activities, and was therefore more challenging and relevant. Residents aged 18-25 years of age are eligible to participate in these groups, the focus of which is to have a learning experience in a fun way.

Hong Lu, who co-ordinates the groups says, "It takes some effort to get the young adults involved, but once that's done there is no stopping them!" Hong says he tries to introduce activities that are fun and have educational and life experience qualities. These include writing a poem as a group; writing a story sentence by sentence with each person contributing a sentence; and visiting the local radio station 91.3FM in Campbelltown to gain a better understanding of how it works.

The results of the groups are, the young adults are more comfortable being themselves; they are more confident, they feel they have a significant "voice" in a community dominated by "older" peers, and it has enhanced their role identification and responsibility within the resident population significantly.

The role of the Board of Odyssey House is important to the ongoing profile and fund raising activities but also important as it plays a pivotal role in the good governance of our organisation.



Odyssey celebrated its 28th year of operation by hosting an Open Day for family, friends, and supporters of its programs. Over 400 people were in attendance to view the completed refurbishment of the 68 year old Mount St. Joseph's Novitiate Seminary building that houses the main treatment facility. 
