The Fundraising Cycle

One of the basic tenets of the rehabilitation program at Odyssey is to get residents to participate in healthy leisure time activities. So it was a natural fit when Simon Poidevin, former Wallaby great and current Managing Director, Equity Research Sales, Citigroup approached us with a fundraising opportunity.

The Goulburn to Citi cycling classic (as it is now known) is older than the Tour De France. The charity ride, held on 23rd September was organised to assist the fundraising efforts of Odyssey House and several other charities including the Kids of Macarthur Health Foundation, Bear Cottage, the Starlight Foundation and the New South Wales Goulburn District Community Palliative Care and Oncology Unit.

The charity ride began at 5:50am in Goulburn with the teams from Citi, the Macquarie Bank and the Campbelltown Catholic Club setting a cracking pace. They made it to the rest station in Mittagong at approximately 8:30am, and completed the 170km journey arriving to the

festive atmosphere of Camden at about 10:30am. In addition to Simon Poidevin, Federal Member for Macarthur, Pat Farmer also participated in the ride. The total funds raised were \$150,000, \$70,000 of which went to Odyssey House as the major beneficiary.

A Road to RECOVERY

To demonstrate the real work of Odyssey House, this column features an Odyssey House resident's story.

In this edition we feature a synopsis of three of our most recent graduates.

Daniel

Daniel became isolated and depressed after his father died when he was 16. He tried to assume much of the responsibility of the household without any role modelling. Daniel tried to be as much support to his mother and younger sister as possible. Due to the pressure these expectations caused Daniel to drink alcohol and smoke marijuana at age 18. Daniel stopped drinking, started to use marijuana exclusively as well as "Speed", Daniel developed a psychotic disorder as a result of his chronic heavy "Speed" use. He was hospitalised for this condition.

Daniel entered Odyssey after an existence of isolation, psychosis and depression in December, 2005. Daniel addressed the issues of communication, rebuilding his relationship with his family and making friends who would support him.

Daniel attends TAFE where he is doing a small business course and plans to become a car dealer. He works part time within the local area.

Lisa

Lisa's life was normal until age 10 when a cousin interfered with her

sexually. She became angry and hostile to all around her. She began to loathe herself, going to school and felt no one cared. Lisa felt alone! There was a lot of turmoil within the family home as her mother and father were in conflict due to her mother's drinking. Eventually Lisa's parents reconciled their differences and Lisa felt more secure until the family decided to move to Newcastle.

Lisa and her family moved to Newcastle eventually. Things got worse as Lisa's mother was diagnosed with cancer. Lisa had become involved in a drug dependent based relationship. Eventually Lisa's mother died and in order to cope Lisa's use of "speed" increased. She was pregnant with her first child and had to have it delivered at 7 months due to her "speed" use. Lisa gave birth to a second child and her relationship ended. Lisa received \$45,000 from the settlement of the sale of her house. Lisa spent all of the money within 2 months on drugs! Despondent, alone and suicidal Lisa contacted Odyssey with the help of her father. She entered the program in September, 2005.

Lisa had no goals, or self esteem from grief due to her mother's death, and had a poor relationship history. Lisa struggled in the program initially as she didn't feel she deserved help. She eventually shared her experience of being sexually abused by her cousin which opened up a whole new experience of being able to express herself.

Although Lisa suffered several setbacks, including having her two children placed in care, she eventually graduated.

Lisa is now working and attending TAFE and plans to complete her Diploma in Counselling. She is also a member of a theatre group and sees her children on weekends and school holidays.

Kane

Kane's life from the onset was unsettled as his mother and father had major conflicts in their relationship. Kane's father left when he was 6 years old. Kane's

Another year has just about been completed and its significance is not lost on us. You see it has been 30 years since Odyssey House first opened its doors to assist what is now over 30,000 people who had alcohol and other drugs problems. We celebrated this milestone recently along with 500 family members, friends and guests.

Upon reflection we have accomplished a great deal again this year as we have in the past. We were able to secure the funding to operate the Magistrates Early Referral Into Treatment (MERIT) program at Waverley Court. We conducted all assessments for people eligible for the program. Due to our participation, over 67% of the people who entered the program have completed it, which is well over the average for programs of this type.

We have responded successfully to the growing number of residents who access our residential services with co-morbid conditions. In addition to a specially tailored group intervention, we were successful in tendering for additional resources from the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing. The program, "Capacity Building for Non Government Organisations to Provide Services to People with Co-morbid Conditions" enabled us to receive \$499,600 in funding for a 3 year period to employ two specialist staff. They will start what we are calling our JANUS project. The name is after the Roman God of the New Year who is depicted as looking both ways. We were able to secure funding most recently from the Commonwealth Attorney General's "Proceeds of Crime Act" for \$655,000 over 3 years to fund our After Care program which provides much needed continuing care services for residents after their complete residential treatment.

We are proud of our achievements over the past year, one out of the 30 years we have been in existence. Our resolve is strong, our commitment unwavering, our vision encompassing. It can be encapsulated in the following; we call it the "Rule of Three"

By first doing I believe it could be done;
The second doing followed with ease;
The third slipped by unnoticed,
I had a habit of living!
