Christmas at Odyssey House

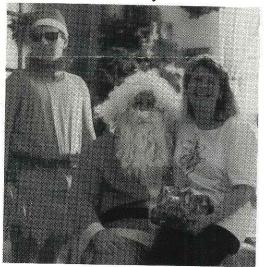

WE ARE 21 YEARS OLD!!!

Odyssey House McGrath Foundation celebrated 21 years of continuous operations with an Open House held on 8 November, 1998. Odyssey House was founded by Sydney businessman, Walter McGrath, in 1977 after his son, James, died of a heroin overdose. From very humble beginnings Odyssey House has developed into one of the most comprehensive centres for the treatment of alcohol and other drug problems.

Over 350 visitors, many of them family members and loved ones, joined Odyssey Board members, staff, and residents to make it a truly special 21st birthday. We were honoured on the day by the presence of Mr Mark Latham, Federal member for the seat of Werriwa, and the Deputy Mayor of Campbelltown, Mr Paul Blyton. Visitors were able to view first hand the tremendous amount of hard work the residents put into their rehabilitation through a series of displays. These earmarked the many accomplishments of each program department during the year.

The highlight of the day was the ground breaking ceremony for the construction of our new purpose built housing for the Parents and Childrens program. Board Chairman, The Hon. Peter Philips, A.M., Danni Wilson, Parents Program Administrator, and Melinda, a parent, did the honours. The monies to build the house were raised through the Odyssey House Corporate Care Appeal headed by Sydney businessman Mr Ross Grant, the Vincent Fairfax Foundation, Sylvia and Charles Viertel Foundation, Variety Club of Australia, James N Kirby Foundation and the Baxter Perpetual Charitable Trust.



The afternoon culminated in the official ceremonies which honoured the many supporters of Odyssey and graduates of the residential and outreach programs.



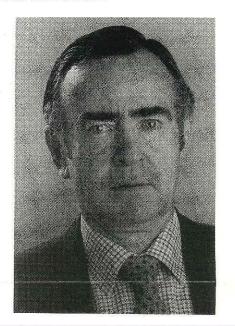

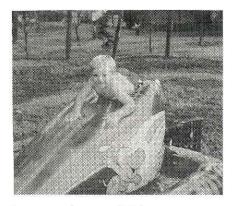

Motherhood would be the most wonderful and difficult experience that I have ever engaged in.

Being a parent in the Odyssey programme only highlights this. I came to Odyssey when my child was 5 months old. Being a first time mother, with no previous knowledge of children has been hard, as I am sure it is for most first time parents. I thought when I came to Odyssey



that I was here to get off drugs. Now I am here not only for that reason but to learn how to be a parent.



Fortunately my child was at an age where my previous lifestyle had little affect on him and during the six months we have been here I have watched him develop into a happy, healthy well adjusted one year old. Not only have I learnt to do all the basic functional things that a parent needs to do, but I have also learnt to just be able to enjoy my child and the time we spend together.

To be able to take him out shopping, to the leisure centre, circus, duckpond and enjoy these things through him. To be able to send him to pre-school everyday and pick him up, with the finger painting, that he has made that day, brings me an indescribable joy.

REFLECTIONS

"When my father left the family I did not feel that this had any effect on me personally as I was too young to understand; however, it had an effect on my mother and eldest brother which I had to live with for years to come.

I have constantly been abused both physically and emotionally from an early age. I can recall instances of both kinds from the age of seven or eight from both my mother and eldest brother. Having been a victim of abuse has damaged my feeling of self worth and my faith in others. After having done Odyssey I learned to accept that this was the damage and that I am no longer a victim of this abuse. I have learned that I deserve to be treated better than that.

In regards to feelings of rejection that I have felt

from my father, I have written to him and he not replied. I accept that this is his choice and I can live with that. At least I won't have to wonder any more if maybe he did wish to know me.

By far the most important issue that I have dealt with has been conflict resolution. I may not be the best at it but at least I don't lean towards a violent solution and can accept confrontation and eventually work towards a compromise rather then be constantly wrapped up in win/lose situations.

As for trusting people I suppose that not a lot has changed although I am now far more willing to take risks. And I can say there are a few people I am willing to put my faith in. Without these people I would not have much of a life."
